From the Assistant Principal

This week Mrs Love and I had the opportunity to attend two days of professional learning with Michael McDowell. Michael is the Superintendent of the Ross School District in San Francisco. He speaks about instruction, learning, leadership and innovation in Education and is the author of several books about project based learning.

During the two days we were challenged to think about rigorous programs of learning where there is clarity of learning outcomes for students, where students are challenged through targeted instruction and feedback and a culture that focuses on students taking ownership of their own learning is encouraged.

As parents we often ask our children "what did you do today?" and of course the response is always "nothing". Michael challenged all of us to flip this question and ask our children questions that focus on their learning.

- *What feedback did you get today and what did you do with it?*
- *What are you learning to do in Maths, Science, English...?*
- *How do you know if you are improving?*
- *Do you help others with their learning?*

When our children know what they are learning and how to improve their learning we are building *assessment capable learners* - children who know what to do when they don't know what to do. As we come to the end of the 2019 school year the challenge is for us to reflect on what our children have learnt to do this year? How has their learning changed and can they see how they have improved? When reports come home next week they will have areas of improvement for students as well as areas for further growth. I encourage you to look at these future goals in a positive way with your children. This helps them to know where they are going with their learning in 2020 and how they can get there.

On Thursday 12 December the children will have the opportunity to meet their teachers for 2020. We encourage you to speak positively about this with your child/ren. As always, the leadership team, in consultation with the staff work hard to ensure that all of our students are placed in learning environments where they feel safe and secure and valued by their peers and

teachers. In all of our learning spaces at St. Paul's, students work collaboratively across the grade on a daily basis and therefore work with all students and teachers in their grade.

We will also offer opportunities for extra transition for some students in the last week of school to ensure that they are able to start the holidays feeling positive about 2020. If you have any concerns please contact Mrs Baird or myself via the office.

2019 Religious Education Goal update

Goal: For all students to articulate the link between Scripture and the living Catholic tradition.

The staff and students have focused on the Mission program at the beginning of Term 4. The students have been involved in focusing on the big idea within their religion lessons. Their lessons have included working with Scripture and exploring what does this mean to them in today's society. They have been involved in living their Catholic Tradition through the involvement of 'Dignity Day' in which they brought in toiletry items for the refugee families. They are ending the year in which all classes are focusing on the Advent/Christmas season in which they were all involved in the collection of 'Christmas Coins' to purchase presents for children who are less fortunate than themselves.

Moving towards 2020 the community of St Paul the Apostle will continue to work on deepening the understanding of Scripture and identifying how we can use this Scripture and Catholic tradition to shape our daily lives.

2019 Literacy Goal update

Goal: By the end of 2019, students will improve their writing by demonstrating an awareness of audience and by making deliberate choices to structure their writing to achieve their intended purpose.

Why is it important for students to demonstrate an awareness of purpose?

When students (and adults) communicate, their purpose is not what *they* want to do; instead, it is what they want *their audience* to do or know as a result of reading what they have written or listening to what they have said. Thus, it involves the audience. To communicate effectively (that is, to achieve their purpose), they must adapt to their audience. Therefore, they must know their audience.

Knowing their purpose and audience helps students determine how and what they are writing and the language and structure of their writing. Audience is the intended group of speakers, listeners or viewers that the writer, designer, filmmaker or speaker is addressing. Students need to make choices about what type of text is appropriate for their audience. It is the same for reading, We choose books to read that will satisfy our purpose. Are students reading to be informed, entertained or persuaded?

Throughout the year, our students have had many opportunities to write for an authentic audience to achieve their purpose. Below are a few examples of these.

- Kindergarten wrote invitations to people in our school community to come along to their pizza party.
- Year 1 wrote letters to Santa and hand delivered them to him while they were on their shopping excursion to Winston Hills Mall.
- Year 2 wrote letters to the residents of Woodberry Village after meeting them on their farm day.
- Year 3 wrote and published a review of the Opera House Tours.
- Year 4 made picture books and presented them to the Year 2 students to read.
- Year 5 made board games and wrote rules and instructions on how to play and presented them to their parents for a 'games' morning.
- Year 6 wrote to council members, CEO's of supermarkets and big companies asking for more environmentally friendly incentives.

Teachers have had many opportunities to engage in professional learning this year. Our major focus this year was on developing Learning Intentions and Success Criteria. As you walk through the classrooms, you may have seen them hanging up on the walls on large butchers paper. Learning Intentions are descriptions from learning outcomes, of what learners should know, understand and be able to do by the end of a learning period. In addition to learning intentions, students may also have individual learning goals that they address in their learning. Success criteria are the measures students and teachers use to determine whether, and how well, learners have met the learning intentions.

2019 Numeracy Goal update

Goal: By the end of 2019, for all students to develop problem solving and reasoning skills to achieve at least one years growth in all four number domains.

Reasoning skills are vital to developing mathematical understanding. With the development of mathematical reasoning, students learn how to select problem-solving strategies, draw logical conclusions, develop and describe solutions, and recognise how those solutions can be applied. Mathematical reasoners are able to reflect on solutions to problems and determine whether or not they make sense.

Over the course of this year, staff have engaged in a number of professional learning opportunities related to the development and assessment of reasoning skills. We have focused on making these skills explicit and visible to students in the classroom and employed *Talk Moves* to encourage students to explain and justify their reasoning, using mathematical language. Teachers have worked collaboratively to develop rich tasks to challenge our learners and modelled the use of reasoning and problem solving skills during reflections. There have also been professional learning provided to teachers through shoulder work with Numeracy Leaders.

The impact of these initiatives are evident when visiting all learning spaces. Student thinking and reasoning outcomes are visible in anchor charts and students are utilising specific mathematical terms when explaining their ideas. They are learning to prove their solutions and to assess their own understandings. The powerful work that has been done this year will continue in 2020.




School Fees



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Diocesan Fees Schedule 2020

Annual Diocesan Tuition Fees - 2020

Annual Diocesan Tuition Fee can be paid upfront at the start of the year or as three equal instalments. The fee is only charged for the first three (3) children currently enrolled in the diocese (in other words there is no additional Diocesan Tuition Fee for the fourth child attending a systemic school in the diocese or other participating Catholic schools - see 'Sibling Discounts' below). To work out how much the fee is for each child, check the table below.

Annual Diocesan Building Levy - 2020

All families with one or more children in a Parramatta Diocesan school or at St Dominic's College, Kingswood are required to pay the annual Diocese of Parramatta Diocesan Building Levy. This levy has replaced the various building levies that parents previously paid to school building funds (managed by either parishes or schools). **The levy for 2020 is \$822 per family, payable in three equal instalments of \$274.**

Annual Diocesan Education Fee Temporary Residents - 2020

The Diocesan Education Fee Temporary Residents for 2020 is **\$2,016 per student, payable in three equal instalments of \$672**. The fee applies to new students on the following Visa numbers: 173, 400, 401, 402, 405, 407, 408, 410, 411, 415, 416, 417, 420, 456, 457, 462, 476, 482, 485, 580, 590, 600, 601, 651, 771, 884, 944, 956, 976 and 977 including where any of these are the preceding visas for families on bridging visas 010 to 090.

Families charged this fee in 2013 will continue to be charged on a per family basis to the eldest student whilst the family has continuous current students.
