Dear Parents and Carers,

From the Assistant Principal

Early Years Assessment (EYA)

At this time of the year our children in Kindergarten, Year 1 and Year 2 will begin their Early Years Assessment. The National Inquiry into the Teaching of Literacy stated that "the assessment of all children by their teachers at school entry and regularly during the early years of schooling is of critical importance in the teaching of reading and in particular to identify children who are at risk of not making adequate progress." This assessment at the beginning, middle and end of year provides the teachers with information on the child's instructional reading level, together with information regarding the strategies the children are using to read. This data assists your child's teacher with planning the next steps for his/her learning. To administer this test, the teachers are given time out of the classroom. Teachers will administer the EYA this term during week 6 and 7. This follows on from the Mathematical Assessment Interview (MAI) which is also administered at the beginning of the year from Kindergarten to Year 6. The collection of this data ensures that every student receives quality instruction at their level.

Online Meet and Greet

In the coming weeks all parents will be invited to make an appointment to attend a Zoom meeting with their child's teacher. Based on current COVID restrictions and guidelines our school has made the decision to facilitate Parent Meet and Greet meetings this term via Zoom. We encourage you to take advantage of this opportunity to meet your child's teacher and share important information about your child. This will not be a parent/teacher interview but rather an opportunity for you to let us know about your child as a learner and about your hopes for them in 2021. Prior to this meeting, a note will come home for you to fill in and return to your child's teacher. This will ask you to highlight your thoughts about your child's areas of strength and areas for growth, as well as provide an opportunity for you to inform your child's teacher about any other important information relevant to their learning. All appointments will be 10 minutes



in length and will be made via an online booking system. Details will be sent home next week and Zoom links will be shared prior to the meeting. We encourage all of our families to take advantage of this important opportunity to work collaboratively in the best interests of our children.

RE Learning

Stage 2 and Stage 3 are implementing the new Draft Religious Education Curriculum. Throughout the learning cycle the students are involved in experiential opportunities. These experiential opportunities are formed when the grade participates in a concrete experience. These experiences can be big or small but it is the sharing of the experience that allows all students to then input into the reflection. These reflections link into the learning cycle to continue and deepen the student's understanding.



Stage 2's learning cycle is "How do we live on prayer?"

Some examples of these experiential opportunities so far include:

- Learning about verbal and non verbal communication through learning some sign language, emoji code breaker, Mr Bean video, and back to back picture drawing.
- Learning about prayer by visiting the Church to pray and then praying on the playground.

As a school community we gathered in our grade spaces to participate in an Ash Wednesday Prayer Liturgy and receive the ashes. The students were reverent and respectful of the beginning of the Season of Lent.

Literacy Learning

A New Program Introduced at St Paul's - R3 Reframing Readers Resourcefully

St Paul's staff work towards enhancing the learning for all our children. We want children to become successful learners, confident creative individuals and active informed citizens. Many of our children have diverse learning needs ranging from those that are visible to those that are not so visible yet have an impact on an individual's learning.

In 2021, Mrs Margaret Govender, will be implementing the Reframing Readers Resourcefully intervention program known as R3. R3 is a 20-week intervention program designed to help Stage 3 (Year 5 and Year 6) students access the meaning within texts required for learning across the curriculum and for pleasure.

The purpose of R3 is to provide students with the knowledge and skills that will enable them to read strategically, and successfully comprehend age-appropriate quality texts.



Everyday for 45 minutes the children in the R3 group will:

- work in a small group of 4 students
- use both fiction and non-fiction texts
- participate in shared reading
- participate in guided reading and reciprocal teaching
- complete after reading tasks
- read independently
- complete a home task which consists of 15 minutes of independent reading.

We thank Mrs Baird for supporting this new program and Mrs Govender for working towards tailoring instruction to meet the learning needs of our children in Stage 3.

Numeracy Learning Numeracy Update

Over the last fortnight, Mrs Fiona Lambert and I have had the pleasure of attending professional learning in the area of numeracy. We have both attended several Extending Mathematical Understanding (EMU) courses in either the Early Years or the Middle Years. This professional learning highlighted some key aspects associated with the teaching and learning of mathematics in some of our youngest children. Some of the key take-aways include the following:

- all children can learn successfully given time and opportunities to engage in high quality mathematics programs that are designed to meet their particular learning needs (Gervasoni & Lindenskov, 2011)
- there remains a critical importance of mathematics and numeracy in today's world
- as educators, it is our role to nurture a love of learning, especially in mathematics, and develop a culture of learning that celebrates challenge, inquiry, and reasoning.

You may find some of my wonderings useful when reflecting on how you, as your child's first educator, currently support your children navigate their learning in mathematics:

- how did your own early numeracy attitudes influence your confidence and willingness to engage in very early numerical tasks and problems?
- have your personal attitudes towards mathematics influenced your children? If so, how?
- are you confident in your approach towards numeracy, and embrace complex challenges?
- are you fixed in your mindset and believe one is simply born 'bad at maths'?
- do your children witness your day-to-day mathematical literacy? eg counting of money, reading of time, counting objects etc
- do you allow your children the ability to challenge themselves numerically, or intervene and rescue them, or do it quickly for them due to a lack of time?
- are mistakes celebrated as opportunities of learning and growth?
- how can we foster a growth mindset, a love of learning, and a willingness to accept challenges and celebrate new learning in mathematics?

These are not easy questions to unpack! But, over the course of the coming weeks, I hope to offer suggestions on how you can best support your child in their learning of mathematics. In the next school newsletter, I will begin by highlighting the first domain your child was assessed on during their Mathematical Assessment Interviews (MAIs) - counting.

Until then, I encourage you to have healthy conversations with your children around mathematics. Save the negative talk ('I'm bad at maths, so you probably will be too', or 'Ask your mother/father- they were the good one at maths') and ask your child what are they currently learning about in mathematics, what feedback did they got today, and where can they go for support if they need help?


As a school we recognise that positive reinforcement is the most powerful behaviour change. By encouraging and reinforcing students for following the expected behaviours we foster a positive school climate. This year we have introduced Roar Cards to each learning space.

Roar Cards

When students demonstrate a safe, respectful or learner behaviour, they may receive a lion stamp on their *Roar Card* to acknowledge this positive behaviour.

Infants: Once a child receives 10 lion stamps they receive a recognition through an agreed activity. Primary: Once a child receives 20 lion stamps they receive a recognition through an agreed activity.

General Information

Teachers as Professionals

As with all professions, teachers have to maintain their accreditation through their attendance at professional learning. Sometimes these take place during the day, in which case a relief teacher will be employed. We have a bank of relief (casual) teachers and always endeavour to employ the same person for a class in order to maintain consistency for the children. Sometimes this is not possible and we thank you in advance for your understanding. Staff also have their entitlements such as long service leave, sick leave, family leave, maternity leave and bereavement leave. On any occasion when a teacher is absent the casual teacher employed follows the class teacher's program and has the support and guidance of the other teachers on the grade as well as the Stage Leader.

Teachers out of class

Currently we have two EMU (Extending Mathematical Understanding) specialist teachers working in the school. Mrs Fiona Lambert (Middle Years) and Mrs Elizabeth Sargent (Early Years). These specialist teachers work with a group of students who require some extra support to help them reach the benchmark for their grade. These lessons occur every day for 45 minutes a day. During this time a designated teacher replaces Mrs Lambert in Year 3. As Mrs Sargent is released from class this year as an Instructional Coach and Stage Coordinator, a replacement teacher is not required.

Staffing Update

Mrs Kathyrn Ireland has made the decision to resign her position at St Paul's and will not be returning to teach Year 1 as planned. Kathryn has worked in various roles in her years at St Paul's and has brought professionalism and dedication to each of them. We wish Kathryn all the best in her future endeavours. We are in the process of advertising and interviewing for a replacement teacher for Year 1I and will let parents know the outcome as soon as possible. Thank you for your understanding.

Wellbeing and Anti Bullying policy

St Paul's aim is to provide a safe, pleasant environment for all children, staff and parents which fosters a sense of belonging, positive self-esteem and a love of learning. Our updated Wellbeing and Anti Bullying policy is available in the office and will be available on our website in the next few weeks.

School Attendance

It is important for your child's wellbeing and academic progress that they attend school regularly and complete each school day. Children need to attend school every day from 8.55am until 3.15pm, unless illness prevents their attendance.

Please ensure that appointments are made outside of school hours in order to ensure that your child can maximise their learning potential. Learning takes place from 8.55am until the final bell at 3.15pm and being late or taking your child early from school, particularly on a regular basis, may hinder their personal and academic progress. This is often reflected in school reports.

Parents taking their children out of school on a regular basis will be contacted by the class teacher, Assistant Principal or Principal. Should you need to take your child out of school early on an unavoidable occasion, a note should be sent in to the class teacher in advance. This will minimise the interruption to learning time for all students. Please avoid disruption to learning by arriving unexpectedly to pick up children without prior notice.

School Absence

If your child is sick you can send a Skoolbag app notification, email or call the school office.

If you inform us with a Skoolbag notification or via email, you do not need to send in another note. Please note that if you call the office you will still need to send a signed note listing the days absent and reason.

Taking leave for family holidays during the school term

Government regulations require you to seek leave approval from the school for holidays of **5 days or more prior to your journey**. Contact the school office for an Application for Extended Leave (L) - Travel Leave—From A.1. This form is also available on our website under School Notes. Travel leave 1-4 days—please send in a written note to the school prior to your leave.

Taking leave for the entertainment industry or an elite sporting event

Government regulations require you to seek an exemption from the school for all leave in the entertainment industry or elite sporting events. Contact the school office for an Application for Exemption from Attendance at School (M) - Form 1.2 prior to attending these events.

Work Health and Safety Reminders

Arrival of children in the morning

At the start of the year, it's always important to remind our community that staff are on duty for supervision of children **from 8.25am** and that parents are responsible for their children until teachers go on duty at 8:25am. Students enrolled in, and attending, before and after school care in the separate facility, which shares part of the school premises, have separate arrival and supervision arrangements with that facility. Students not enrolled in before and after school care are considered to be in the care of parents or carers before 8:25am. Students arriving prior to 8:25am do so at your risk and will not be supervised. The school commences supervision and care for students and permits student arrival on school premises from 8:25am each school day. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding.

No Smart Watches at school

Students accessing the internet for their learning sign a ICT agreement at the start of every year. It has also been our custom and practice at school to have any students with mobile phones drop them at the office in the morning and collect them in the afternoon. IF you need to contact your child urgently, please call the office. Please be advised that students are not to wear smartwatches to school. The reason for this is that these watches can be distracting from our core focus on learning, especially if students are receiving and sending messages during school time. These watches also have the capacity to photograph and record, which is not appropriate in a school setting. Other watches such as analog, digital and step measuring watches are acceptable. We thank you for your understanding and support in helping us keep our community safe.

Parish Carpark

It is a privilege for St Paul's Primary School to use the Parish car park. For this practice to continue we need to treat our parish community with respect and only park in the allocated spaces. At St Paul's we have a number of children who require assistance and support and their families have a "disabled" sticker/sign for their car. Please do not park in these designated spaces unless you have such a sign.

The safety of children and adults is critical when collecting children from school. Please observe all parking signs and road rules when collecting children to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all members of our school and community. As families begin to use the new ramp to Buckley's Road, please hold your children's hand and use the pedestrian crossing to cross the road.

Kiss 'n' Drop

This week your child will have received a Safety Door Sticker provided by NSW Government as part of their road safety campaign. You are encouraged to attach the sticker inside the window of the rear passenger door closest to the kerb to remind children to use the Safety Door when getting in and out of the car. Parents are reminded that you are not to exit your car if using Kiss 'n' Drop. If your child requires assistance, please park your car and walk them to the gate.

Pedestrians in Church Carpark

If you and your children are pedestrians entering the car park in the morning or exiting the car park in the afternoon, please keep your children by your side and hold their hand. Please be conscious of cars that may be reversing out of car parking spaces. Remember that it can be harder to see a smaller person than an adult. We thank you for your assistance and courtesy in ensuring the safety of everyone during access to the school.

Social Distancing COVID-19

Our staff continue to be vigilant with monitoring and acting regarding children who appear to be unwell. Please keep your child at home if you think they are sick, runny nose, cough, headache etc If a child presents as unwell at school, they will be isolated from other children and staff in the sick bay or an area of the office. Parents will be contacted to collect their child immediately. We understand that this may be difficult but it is in the best interests of the school community as a whole.

- Additional cleaning is taking place on a daily basis.
- Our staff are reminding students how and when to wash their hands.
- There are soap dispensers in the toilets, and these are topped up regularly.
- Signs have been placed in classrooms and toilets to remind the children and to demonstrate to them appropriate hand washing procedures.
- Each class has been provided with hand sanitizer, disinfectant wipes and additional paper towels.
- All learning spaces have designated "used tissues only" bins with lids which are emptied daily.
- The school has discouraged handshakes, hugs and kisses.
- Please limit the number of people in the foyer to five if there are 5 or more, please wait outside.
- Our amended line up afternoon dismissal procedures are in place and we ask that parents do not enter the space under the COLA, please wait on the outer area for your child.
